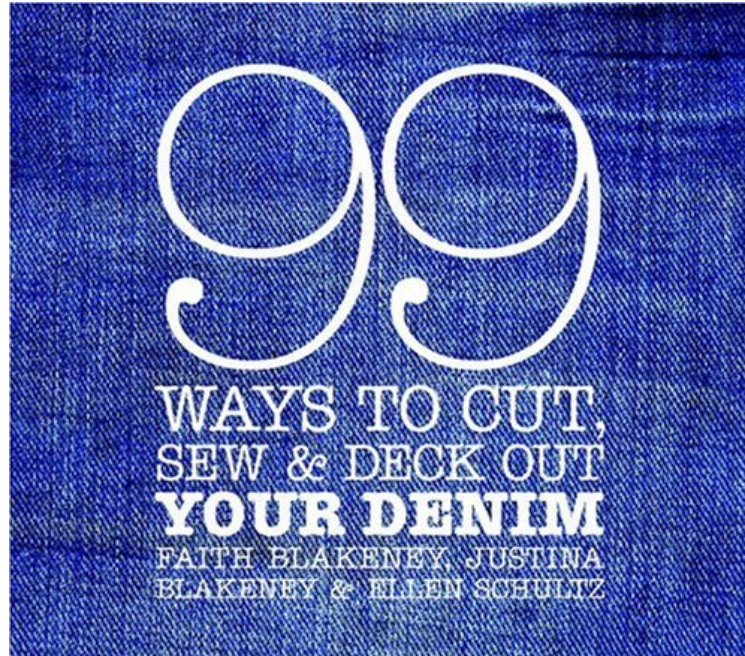

This book is a waste of money. The projects in this book were obviously done by 1st year design students given a time limit of 1 hr, and a pair of jeans. The creations are unwearable, uninspired and for the most part just plain ugly. I do not consider project #66 a "Jean Masterpiece"it is just some large pieces of scrap jeans sewn into a new rectangle. I would not consider project #95 "mermaid skirt" a *new idea*.....people have cut the legs apart and made a skirt out of jeans for the last 4 decades or so. I do not need someone to show me how to cut a scrap of denim and glue it to a headband like project #74, or wrap it on a cut up piece of a 2 ltr bottle to make a "bracelet" like project #51, or tie it as a belt. If you consider cutting off a longer jean skirt to make a "mini skirt" (project #29) or sewing a couple of patches on the jeans (project #2, #19 #60) or a potholder (project#48) or a rice bag (project #10) or an eyemask (project #67) or adding embroidery to jeans (project #26) as *new* or *innovative* then I guess this book may be right up your alley. However, I'm pretty sure you could get the information on the web somewhere for free. Even the several handbag projects in this book were amateur looking (IMHO) and I'm pretty sure done to death already. Light in tone, this guide is chatty and hip. Projects range from a sundress to a flower pin, a banana bag, and an iPod case. Each pattern takes one spread. The introduction notes that the authors' *99 Ways to Cut, Sew, Trim Tie Your T-Shirt into Something Special* (Potter, 2006) requires less-advanced skills. Readers are instructed to review the illustrated glossary of techniques and to go over a pattern before beginning work on it. Projects are rated on a scale of difficulty and approximate time for completion is listed. Use of a sewing machine is recommended. Each pattern includes a line drawing, with a superimposed photograph depicting the finished project, and illustrated diagrams with step-by-step, basic instructions. The book also includes two techniques for creating patterns and explains how to take body measurements. Instructions for each pattern are very basic and assume some knowledge of sewing/tailoring or studious use of the glossary.
