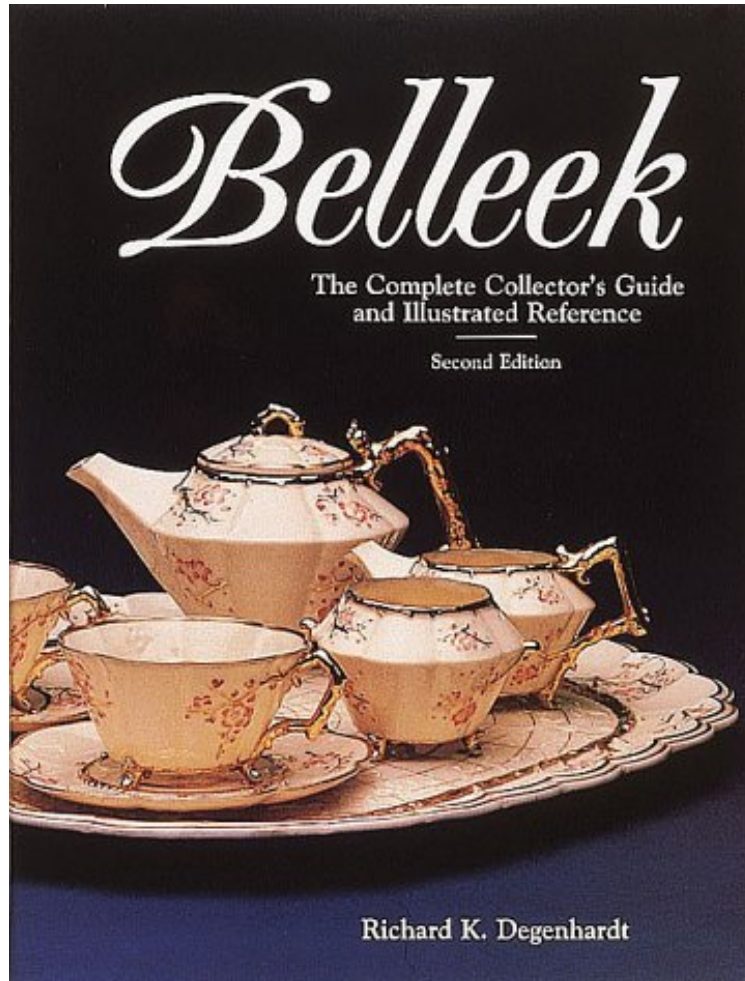

Everything you might want to know of Belleek's history, their craftsmanship techniques, marks for dating pieces, and black and white and color photographs of most pieces made by Belleek including trial pieces never released for mass production. It even has a price guide for identification of your pieces and the price based on the marks first to ninth mark when the book was published.However, Belleek is now on its 14th mark and has passed two milestones of one year marks: 2007 150th anniversary and 2000 Millennium pieces.

The book due to its copyright date misses these and contemporary pieces. This would not be a problem were it not for the fact that Belleek was forced to stop using its trademark yellow iridescent cob glaze during the 6th mark period when it was found to contain lead. Treasured for this glaze, Belleek went through a period in its 7th gold mark to leave everything white or pearlescent. After passing the 2000 Millennium pieces and 2007 150th anniversary mark with tries at use of color and gilt, they started around the 13th mark 2008 to present to paint shamrocks on everything. It contains an extensive history of the pottery and those who developed this unique ware. It provides a thorough explanation of the process of manufacturing. It shows us the various marks, or backstamps and discusses their meanings. My only quibble with the book is the price guide, which is somewhat incomplete and which does not reflect the effect that online auctions have had on collecting. From Library Journal Since 1857, the fine Irish porcelain known as Belleek has been prized by collectors worldwide. This volume, written by the American founder of the International Belleek Collectors' Society, is a revised and expanded edition of his 1978 classic. In addition to providing a complete history of the firm, Degenhardt has painstakingly compiled a well-illustrated gallery of the company's output with photos of museum pieces as well as those in private collections. Included, too, are reproductions of the rare 1904 and 1928 catalogs, collectors' items in their own right, which illustrate the company's less-well-documented early wares. The book also contains such useful information as a complete listing of makers' marks and a price guide.
