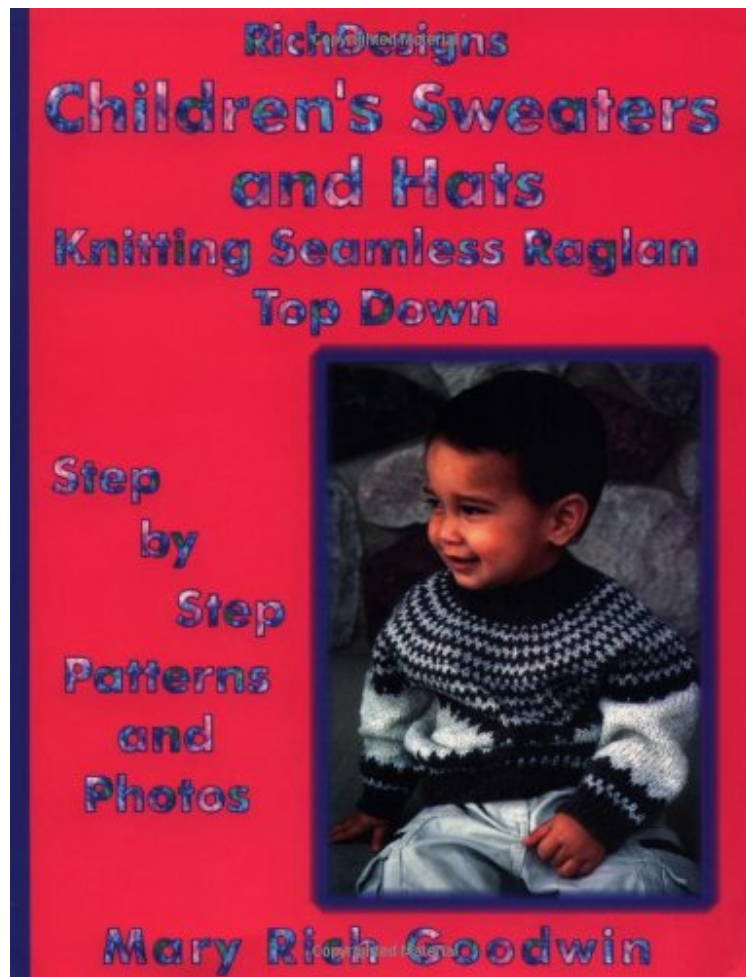

Reprinted by permission. All rights reserved. Of the over 2000 sweaters I have designed and knit, people say they love these beautiful sweaters the best. This book contains seamless patterns knit from the top down. With circular and double point needles, the seamless sweater is accomplished. The increases are hidden in the yoke of the sweater by working a Make 1 stitch. The texture of the yarn is important since it also helps hide the increase stitches. I call these raglan-less sweaters since there are no noticeable raglan lines down the yoke. Once the yoke is complete, the sleeves are knit circular all the way down to the cuff, using either shorter circular needles, or DP needles. The body is then knit circular on longer circular needles and there are no seams to knit together. I explain various techniques and the reason and explanation for the different needles. I also provide helpful tips, a stitch glossary, and a design section with ideas for designing your own motifs, plus a sample of knitting graph paper for you to use.
